A different kind of security blanket

Like so many other two-year-olds, Sophia has a security blanket a pink fuzzy "blankie" that she often wears like a shawl. Right now that's good enough for this irresistibly cute toddler with big brown eves, but her parents have another form of security in mind for her.

Sandra and Carlos will be raising Sophia in a decent and safe home of their own that they partnered with Paterson Habitat to buy. Their new house on North 1st Street is almost ready. It will be home to three generations since the household includes Sandra's parents, Maria and Omar.

"We are so excited," Sandra said. "Before we learned about Habitat I didn't see how it would be possible to do this."

Like all new Habitat homeowners they put in 400 hours of volunteer "sweat equity" labor. But like so many of our families, hard work is a way of life for them. Sandra's weekday job for an office maintenance firm begins at 3:30 a.m. and she does catering work at a country club on weekends. Carlos does valet parking for an auto dealership. Even her father, 74 years old, works part-time.

The apartment they are leaving has been home to Sandra since she joined her parents here 23 years ago after immigrating to Paterson from Colombia, Now a proud American citizen, she met and married Carlos on a trip back to Colombia.

This extended family spent years battling the landlord over faulty plumbing and more recently a family of raccoons who had moved into the attic above them. Sophia's birth convinced them it was time to find a new way of living.

"In our new house," Carlos says with pride. "We'll even have a little yard where Sophia can play."

4th Ward revitalization area two-thirds completed, new homes and new life for a whole neighborhood



A classic real estate maxim says three things determine the value of a home: location ... location ... and location.

For decades, a 12-block section of Paterson's 4th Ward was a location where homes were abandoned rather than built. A neighborhood starved for significant investment and healthy growth.

This is the same 12-block section Paterson Habitat identified over five years ago as our 4th Ward Revitalization Area. In partnership with 4th Ward community leaders, we committed to reviving this neighborhood as a place where hardworking low-income families could live in decent homes and on safe streets.

The core of the revitalized neighborhood will be 75 homes built or renovated by Paterson Habitat and filled with homeowner families committed to the area's future. This has been the most ambitious project in the history of Paterson Habitat – and thanks to our donors and construction volunteers it's two-thirds completed.

Now we've started the third and final stage of the 4th Ward Revitalization Area project and we need the help of our friends with a special fundraising campaign called "Hamilton 7 & Beyond." Named for seven homes we're now building on Hamilton Street (artist rendering above), this campaign will raise \$2.5 million towards completion of all 25 homes in the final third of this initiative.

In addition to building homes, the **Hamilton 7 & Beyond** campaign will "build" the quality of life in this newly-revitalized neighborhood. The campaign will strengthen numerous community initiatives such as: residents accessing fresh and healthy produce at the Green Acres community garden, joining in local public safety efforts through the 4th Ward CPTED (crime prevention through environmental design) and enjoying beautified public spaces such as the new Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Public Park on Auburn Street.

Given the scope of this effort and its impact on families, we're asking supporters to make a special gift earmarked for the **Hamilton 7 & Beyond** campaign in addition to their regular donations. This kind of generosity is enabling us to make a lasting improvement in the lives of 75 families and in the neighborhood they'll call home.

Acts of kindness continue



A year ago, Paterson Habitat joined Habitat affiliates across the country in accepting the King Center's challenge to undertake 50 acts of kindness and service to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's death. We wanted to do our part to build the Beloved Community – one dedicated to justice, equal opportunity, and love of fellow human beings - that Dr. King envisioned right here in Paterson. And, with your help, we did it. Not only did 50 volunteers pick an act of kindness and/or service from our "MLK 50 Forward" action board, but Paterson Habitat also stepped forward to create a new Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. city park across from the church in the 4th Ward of Paterson where Dr. King spoke just a week before his death. We broke ground on the MLK Public Park last November and the Park is scheduled to be completed in late Spring 2019. It's a labor of love of the Paterson community and will be a place of peace and contemplation for generations to come.

Habitat for Humanity International has signed up with the King Center in Atlanta for another year of building the Beloved Community so watch for new plans in Paterson in the coming months. You can always visit **patersonhabitat.org/50forward** to see what Paterson Habitat is doing locally.

Delivering shoes & building homes in Malawi



When a team of Paterson Habitat volunteers arrived for a second home building visit to the poverty-stricken African nation of Malawi in November 2018, each team member's luggage included a duffel bag stuffed with pairs of



children's shoes. Partnering with the nonprofit that's designed sandal-style shoes for boys and girls which expand up to five sizes (theshoethatgrows.org), over 500 children now can walk to school and play sports with decent footwear. But more importantly, over the

past two years, Paterson Habitat has sent \$38,000 from its annual tithe contributions to Malawi and our volunteers have helped to build five houses. These Global Village (GV) trips are part of Paterson Habitat's "Travel with a Purpose" (TWAP) program. A November 2019 trip to Jordan is currently being planned.
